1 CHEROKEE COUNCIL HOUSE 2 CHEROKEE, NORTH CAROLINA 3 Date: _____APR 0 4 2024 4 5 RESOLUTION NO. 175 (2024) 6 7 8 A resolution opposing new construction on Moccasin Bend, a peninsula on the 9 Tennessee River near Chattanooga, Tennessee, and supporting efforts to preserve 10 Moccasin Bend's natural, historic and cultural resources. 11 12 WHEREAS, the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians (Tribe) is a federally recognized Indian 13 tribe whose ancestral homelands include a large part of North Carolina, northwest 14 Georgia, eastern Tennessee and southwest Virginia; and 15 16 WHEREAS, Cherokee people have occupied this region for thousands of years, but most were 17 forcibly removed in 1838 by the U.S. government, on what is now called the Trail 18 of Tears, under authority of the Indian Removal Act of 1830; and 19 20 WHEREAS, the capitol of Cherokee at the time was New Echota, near present-day Calhoun, in 21 Northwest Georgia, and Cherokee citizens were well-established there and at 22 nearby Chattanooga, Tennessee. Historians and archeologists believe the first 23 contact between Europeans and American Indians in the area was during the year 24 1513; and 25 26 WHEREAS, American Indians occupied the Tennessee River peninsula known as Moccasin 27 Bend for thousands of years and there is evidence of ancient villages and burial 28 mounds at the site; and 29 30 WHEREAS, in the early 1800s, travelers crossed the Tennessee River at Moccasin Bend by 31 using Brown's Ferry, which was owned and operated by the Brown family, who 32 were mixed (Cherokee and European) ancestry; and 33 34 WHEREAS, in 1805 the United States government built what is known as the "Federal Road" 35 across Moccasin Bend, at the site of Brown's Ferry, and this road is well-36 documented as being part of the Trail of Tears. The Federal Road was also used 37 by Union army supply wagons during the Civil War in 1863; and 38 39 WHEREAS, efforts to preserve Moccasin Bend began in the early 20th century, with a vision 40 that it would become a National Park. That effort was abandoned in 1953 by 41 Tennessee Governor Frank Clements, and Moccasin Bend has seen multiple 42 developments since then: the State of Tennessee built the Moccasin Bend Mental 43 Health Institute there in 1961; and local officials and businesses have built a law 44 enforcement firearms training range; radio towers; a golf course; and a 45 wastewater treatment facility on Moccasin Bend; and 46

1	WHEREAS, Moccasin Bend is the only National Historic Landmark in Hamilton County,
2	Tennessee and the only National Archeological District in the United States; and
3	
4	WHEREAS, Moccasin Bend is an important part of Cherokee history, and should be preserved.
5	
6	NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Tribal Council of the Eastern Band of
7	Cherokee Indians, in Council assembled, at which a quorum is present, that the
8	Tribe opposes new construction activities on the Tennessee River peninsula known
9	as Moccasin Bend, in Hamilton County, Tennessee.
10	
11	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Tribe supports efforts to preserve Moccasin Bend's
12	natural, historic and cultural resources.

14	BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that all prior resolutions that are inconsistent with this
15	resolution are rescinded, and this resolution shall become effective when ratified
16	by the Principal Chief.
