(2019) 10 11 12 WHEREAS, Western Carolina University (WCU) College of Arts and Sciences has recently rehabilitated its archaeological collections curation facility, an 13 14 archive that houses extensive and scientifically important collections from 15 southwestern North Carolina and adjacent areas; and 16 17 WHEREAS, with financial support from the United States Forest Service, the collections facility has increased capacity by 80% for future expansion and 18 19 is transformed into a modern facility that conforms to the Secretary of the 20 Interior's federal guidelines for the curation of archaeological collections; 21 and 22 23 with this upgrade, WCU now assumes responsibility as the official WHEREAS, repository for United States Forest Service-owned collections of materials 24 25 associated with the Cherokee Trail of Tears; and 26 27 the name of the town that once occupied WCU's present Cullowhee WHEREAS, campus was derived from Cherokee oral traditions recorded in the 28 29 nineteenth century as summarized below: 30 In 1826, Cherokee Assistant Principal Chief, Charles R. Hicks, wrote a 31 series of letters to future Chief John Ross to educate him on traditional 32 history (and prepare him for leadership roles); in these letters, Hicks 33 34 relates a migration story from the 1770s that concludes with Cherokees settling at a place called Two Sparrows (Tali Tsisgwayahi), near the head 35 of the Tuckasegee River. Another elder, who gave testimony in the 1830s. 36 37 identifies Two Sparrows as a holy place, where the surrounding hills were supposed to contain large villages of immortals. In 1887, Smithsonian 38 ethnographer James Mooney recorded Cherokee sources who referred to 39 the mound and ancient town site on what is now WCU's central campus as 40 Tsisksitsi, meaning "a place typified by sparrows." Mooney's 41 Tsisk[waya]sitsi (where the sparrows are, in a typical fashion) and Hicks' 42. Tali Tsisgwayahi (Two Sparrows Place) appear to be the same, and 43 designate the place that Western Carolina University now is located; and 44 45
